very new dogs Puppies, puppies, puppies! After spending the last few months following their careening attention spans and wobbly wanderings, crawling on my stomach and almost being driven to use "auto-focus," my impressions of them wiggle all over my memory and are about as hard to corral as a litter of Labs. I get mental yips of joy when I think of their condensed milk breath and those little stubby noses that all pups start out with no matter how pointy the genes. My brain smiles at their zealous explorations of their new world, their ferocious attacks on mere leaves, and how, when their last calorie is spent, they collapse almost anywhere into a pile of loose limbs and bare bellies. • But is all this enough to explain the thrall that I share with even the most cynical? (The congratulations to the new owner that are only a few emotional decibels down from those awarded a new baby?) At first, puppies' appeal would seem to be simply their high amusement factor, which does account for a lot. But if it were just their comic antics, would we put up with sleepless nights and lonely shoes and months of paper training? Even if I add to the sum of their charms the way they inspire our tenderness with their sweet vulnerability and their unbinged enthusiasm, expressed by total tongue licks and full body wiggles? . To be sure, all of the above does help to mitigate some of the aforementioned trials of puppyness, but I would like to add my own two cents as an amateur animal observer. I think that puppies create such emotional commotion because we see in them qualities that will emerge after the brief frolic of puppybood. Once in a while, when they stop chewing, yelping, and chasing, we get a glimpse into their little puppy souls. What we see shining through are the beginnings of loyalty, trust, and, as I said in my first book, What Dogs Do, some very important wisdom. Qualities that I think are the essence of dog; qualities that start young and endure long after training and age have matured the wiggles into dignified wags.






